

He is currently an Associate Professor in the Department of Agriculture and Nutrition Science at Southern Utah University. Dean began his teaching career in 1981. In the fall of 1990 he joined the faculty at Southern Utah University teaching Agronomy.

During the summers, Dean worked as a research technician and assistant farm manager for Utah Power & Light Research Farms. Dean is involved in many service activities with SUU, the community, extension service, and the local high schools. He admits that one his favorite activities is the Cedar Livestock & Heritage Festival.

The classes focus on different aspects of wellness aiming to educate students on healthy living.

TEMPE ARIZONA



Dr. Kelly Goonan traveled with six students from the ORPT 4740 class to Tempe, AZ to work at the annual Tempe Festival of the Arts (TFA). TFA is one of the oldest and largest community art festivals in

the United States and is held annually each March and December. The festival hosts 350 vendors and over 150,000 patrons during the three day event. Attendees enjoy food, live entertainment, and variety of local art.

Students in ORPT 4740 work with the festival organizers to learn about event planning and management and work in a variety of program areas throughout the festival weekend. Before returning, students had breakfast with their organizational partners and reflected on their first TFA experience. Students were surprised by how much they contributed to the overall functioning of the festival, commenting that they expected to do more shadowing and less independent work.

The students appreciated the opportunity to take active roles in the festival and be entrusted with higher levels of responsibility. They learned about being flexible and problem solving in the moment when conditions outside their control take an unexpected turn.

SELF DEFENSE AT SUU

Southern Utah University (SUU) is collaborating with the Elizabeth Smart Foundation (ESF) to offer Smart Defense™ self-defense classes to students enrolled at SUU. Smart Defense™ will be a one-credit elective course offered during the fall and spring semesters.

"SUU is honored to partner with the Elizabeth Smart Foundation as the first university to incorporate Smart Defense™ into its course offerings," said SUU President Mindy Benson. "This training reinforces our commitment to student safety and well-being, and it equips students with invaluable skills, strength and confidence that will benefit them in their college life and beyond."

Smart Defense™ is a self-defense training program led by ESF and the Malouf Foundation™. Both nonprofits work to confront sexual violence and exploitation, and they officially joined forces earlier this year to maximize their impact.

The course curriculum was designed by hand-picking self-defense techniques and skills from a number of martial arts styles including Krav Maga, Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu and Muay Thai. Each technique was selected with the objective of giving participants the best chance or advantage to stop a potential threat or escape an attacker.

Smart Defense[™] not only teaches physical defense, but it also educates individuals on red flags and unsafe situations, as well as consent and healthy relationships. All Smart Defense[™] instructors are thoroughly vetted and trained to be traumainformed.

100% ON NCLEX

SUU's Nursing Program had their first 100% NCLEX pass Rate HP group this fall. They graduated August 2022 with 17 students in the group. The courses at SUU combine classroom and experiential learning, emphasizing caring, critical thinking, patient safety, ethical decisionmaking, communication, civic responsibility, and professional excellence. This provides an ideal learning experience that allows students to both know the material but also put it into practice as they engage in hands on learning.

POWER IN PINK

At the 10-year anniversary of the *Power in Pink* 5K walk/run for breast cancer, the nursing program took home the trophy for the most college participants for the 3rd year in a row. Power in Pink is an annual 5K event that raises funds for individuals undergoing breast cancer treatment. It also commemorates those who survived breast cancer.
