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





With up to 13,000 attendees, this conference is focused on the newest nutrition research and practices. Lyman and Ibiyemi were able to participate in a wide variety of sessions, with topics such as leadership, eliminating biased language, disease of obesity, food as medicine, binge eating disorder, pediatric trauma, and eating disorders in male athletes. Lyman has since been able to implement the information learned in the sessions her Nutrition Counseling, Nutrition Assessment, Dietetic Professionalism, and Nutrition Foundation courses.

Ibiyemi is a member of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics and hence was invited to attend the conference. He presented a poster that focused on the objective and subjective measurements of fruits and vegetables using new technology - the veggie meter device.




Our SUU graduate student LeighAnne T. Paulson competed in the Graduate Student Research Competition for the SWACSM, and was one of only seven graduate students who made the final cut to present. Paulson submitted a 5-page expanded abstract about her thesis project on "Physical Function in Young and Older Adult Active Pickleball Players". She was able to proceed with giving an oral presentation at the conference (pictured below).





Two undergraduate Exercise Science teams, Team 1 (Talon Thornton, Korina Ziegler, and Wesley Ziegler) and Team 2 (Eric Lambert, Spencer Maxwell, Kjerstin Woodrum) competed in Student Jeopardy at the SWACSM. Over 20 universities from the integrated Southwest region competed at the conference. Team 1 placed 2nd, only missing a single question, while Team 2 placed 4th. SUU was the highest ranking Utah university by far, finishing higher than both BYU and UVU.

HONORS CAPSTONE PROJECT


James Woodrum is a senior student in the Exercise Science program. With the plan to become a chiropractor as a future career he recently completed the Honors Capstone Project with the main focus of inquiry on people's perception of chiropractic care. The purpose of Woodrum's study was to assess current perceptions towards chiropractic medicine. He also wanted to determine where and how these

various perceptions come from with the intention to see if further education is one way to decrease the prevalence of negative perceptions. This may further eliminate the barriers that exist that prevent patients from seeking out chiropractic care. Woodrum surveyed a total of 59 participants using a nonprobability sampling survey by posting fliers around Southern Utah University campus. Results indicated that about 40% of participants have been discouraged from seeking a chiropractic treatment via family member, friend, or an online source. Due to a small infographic reading sample there was a significant increase (p<0.05) in the participants' likelihood for visiting a chiropractor, significant increase (p<0.01) in chiropractic knowledge, and significant decrease (p<0.01) in the opinion that chiropractic care is dangerous. Learning about the common negative perceptions as well as sharing positive information made the study a success with Woodrum pleased with results. A Honors Capstone Project is approved to fall under any one of the following categories: Honors Thesis, Creative or Experiential Projects, or Honors Capstone within Major. "I have had the amazing opportunity to further my education about chiropractic before graduate school. Thank you to anyone who participated in my study and made this possible!" Woodrum expressed during a recent interview.

NURSING PLEDGING CEREMONY

On Monday October 30th, forty new Nursing students participated in the Pledging Ceremony in the R. Haze Hunter Great Hall. Each student has a significant role in preparing for the event, including creating and designing invitations as well as developing a video to

introduce themselves. Most important is they create their pledge. Two student leaders along with **Prof. Shane Yardley** shared motivating advice during the ceremony. A musical number was also performed. **Prof. Donna Lister** expresses that, "The reason the Department of Nursing has pledge ceremonies is because involvement in the process of creating the ceremony and the pledge, and especially participating in recitation of the pledge, students frequently experience an increased commitment to their role in the profession they have chosen." Nursing students are able to take the pledge in front of their family members, school leadership, and peers to acknowledge and recognize their primary (and future professional) obligation of caring for the patient.



SUU Nursing has been recognized as one of the nation's best schools for online degrees and certificates in the healthcare field going into 2024 by EduMed. Only six percent οf regionally accredited colleges universities earned a ranked position. SUU Nursing was ranked #35 out of 747 for the Top 50 Most Affordable Online RN to BSN Programs available nationwide in 2024, which ranks us in the top 4.7%. The NCLEX NCSBN report has been received from the Utah Department of Public Licensure (DOPL). SUU Nursing's 2023 third quarter results had 15 of 15 first time NCLEX test takers (students) pass the exam, making this quarter a 100% pass rate for the program. These 15 students were mainly from the SUU Health Professions BSN (HP-to-BSN)

Nursing program. This is SUU's third group of HP to BSN nursing students to graduate and is a unique, one of a kind nursing program across the country. This program includes students from many different health professions and is three semesters long. It represents a "fast track" for those with already possess a healthcare license wanting to become a BSN nurse while receiving credit for their previous healthcare experience. SUU's RN to BSN online nursing program has been ranked as one of the best nursing programs by RNCareers.org, a well known national company for ranking nursing programs. RNCareers.org ranked SUU's RN-to-BSN online nursing program as #2 in the state of Utah naming personalized learning, experienced faculty, state-of-the-art resources, flexibility, affordability, and preparation for career advancement as the top key factors for this ranking.


COHS SCHOLARSHIP SYMPOSIUM
