

# FEES AND FINANCIAL AID

## Tuition and Fees

Tuition is set by the Utah State Legislature, and fees are determined by the University administration and the State Board of Regents. The administration and board reserve the right to change tuition and fees as necessary. The following information is current as of March 22, 2000.

Tuition and fees will be assessed to all students including extended day school students and summer school students according to the following schedules. Extended day school and daytime credit hours are combined in assessing tuition. The two sessions of summer school are considered as one semester. All students who attend summer school pay in-state tuition. Tuition and fees are payable at the time of registration.

Students who have questions regarding their residence status should inquire at the Admissions Office.

Students registered for fewer than 10 credit hours in any regular academic semester daytime or evening class for credit may receive a student activity card by paying the difference between what they have paid and the full-time student fees.

Charges for non-credit or other continuing education classes shall be as stated in the extended day school and summer school bulletins.

All students are obligated to pay their fees at the time of registration. The Cashier's Office hours are from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays. Financial arrangements for payment of fees are the responsibility of the student.

All students registering for physical education activity courses are expected to provide themselves with gymnasium shoes and suits, and such other equipment as is required. Some equipment may be rented from the physical education department.

Students are held responsible for any damage done by them to University property.

**Late Payment Fee:**

A fee for late payment of amounts due the University will be assessed in the amount of \$15 per week that the amount remains unpaid, beginning after the first week of classes.

The University reserves the right to unregister students for nonpayment of tuition and fees and to withhold registration, grades, transcripts and diplomas for nonpayment of obligations to SUU.

Admission and late-payment fees are not refundable.

\*The day class instruction begins is counted as the first day of the refund period in determining the refund percentage. A shortened refund schedule is used for summer terms.

**Repayments:** Students who withdraw may be required to repay a portion of the financial aid advanced to them for "living expenses" (education expenses other than tuition, fees and school services). Repayments will be calculated in accordance with the repayment formula established by Federal regulations. In determining the number of elapsed weeks, any portion of a week shall be counted as a full week, and school terms will be treated as if they were six weeks long, except summer terms for which a proportionately-shortened refund schedule is used.

Repayments to any federal financial-aid program may not exceed those disbursed from that program, and will be repaid in the following priority order:

- (1) Federal Stafford Loan (unsubsidized),
- (2) Federal Stafford Loan (subsidized),
- (3) Federal Plus loan,
- (4) Federal Perkins Loan,
- (5) Federal Pell grant,
- (6) Federal SEOG,
- (7)

Other Title IV aid, (8) Non-Title IV aid.

Except in cases of unusual, documented circumstances, students owing repayments to any Title IV program will be given four weeks from the time they are notified of the repayment due. If no effort has been made to make repayment by the end of four weeks, the account will be referred to the U.S. Department of Education and the student will be shown as in default on University records.

## FINANCIAL AID

Most student financial aid is awarded on a basis of need. Grants, loans and part-time employment are available from funds provided by the Federal government, the state of Utah, private organizations and interested individuals.

Students are responsible to pay the cost of university attendance; however, those students whose personal and family resources are insufficient to meet educational expenses may qualify to receive financial assistance from one or more of the available programs. Nevertheless, the availability of financial assistance programs **does not** replace a student's responsibility to make certain his/her university obligations are paid.

Financial aid applications may be submitted throughout the school year and students who qualify may receive financial-aid awards retroactively; however, funding for some types of assistance is limited and may be fully committed before late applicants establish their eligibility. **The Financial Aid Office cannot guarantee that funds will be available for the start of any given term unless applications are complete, accurate and on file in the Financial Aid Office together with any requisite supporting documentation no later than 45 days prior to the beginning of the term.**

### Applications

Applications for financial aid can be obtained through high school counselors, or by contacting the Financial Aid Office, 167 Sharwan Smith Center, Southern Utah University, Cedar City, Utah 84720, (435) 586-7735. Financial-aid Transcripts from all previously-attended institutions are required for transfer students.

### Grants

Financial-aid grants are awarded on a basis of need and repayment is not required unless a recipient fails to complete the classes for which funding was received. Grants are available for undergraduate study only.

**Federal Pell Grants** are the principal Federal grant program and are considered to be the primary source of federal assistance. The maximum annual Pell award for the 1999-2000 school year is \$3,125. At the present time, the Pell program is open ended and all students who qualify may receive a grant.

**Federal Supplemental Opportunity Grants.** To qualify students must have "exceptional need." funds are very limited and are awarded on a first-come, first-served basis.

**Federal Work Study** is a program through which the federal government grants money to institutions to be used to compensate student workers. The grant to SUU in recent years has remained at about \$200,000 to which the University adds 25 percent. In addition, the University

employs many students who are paid exclusively from University funds.

**State Student Incentive Grants** are federal grants given to states which are matched and distributed between institutions to be awarded to students. Funding is limited and individual student grants are restricted to Utah residents with special needs.

### Loans

Loans made under the Federal Family Education Loan Program are funded by financial institutions and guaranteed by the federal government. Stafford Loans range from \$500 to \$5,500 per year for undergraduate students and up to \$8,500 for graduate students. The federal government pays the interest on Subsidized Stafford Loans until six months after the student leaves school. Unsubsidized Stafford loans are essentially the same but there are no interest subsidies. PLUS (Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students) are guaranteed by the federal government, but the borrowers are responsible for the interest. FFEL program loans are available to all qualifying applicants.

**Federal Perkins Loans** are made through the University to qualifying students. Borrowers may apply to have part of their Perkins loans canceled if they teach in designated low-income schools or in a recognized handicapped program or in certain other specialized circumstances. Perkins funds are limited.

**Short-term Loans** are made to students to meet immediate school-related needs while federal aid or personal funding is forthcoming. These loans are made from funds contributed by private donors and, normally, must be repaid within the semester. As with other aid programs, applicants must maintain satisfactory academic progress to qualify.

## SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS

To be eligible to receive federal financial assistance or a University short-term loan while attending Southern Utah University, a student must be enrolled at least half time, be in good standing, and maintain satisfactory academic progress through a course of study toward a certificate or degree. He/she must also be a citizen of the United States or an eligible alien.

1. **"Good standing"** means one is academically qualified to continue in attendance, and is in compliance with the accepted and approved enrollment standards and practices of both the university and the financial aid department.

2. Financial Aid categories of enrollment for undergraduate students are:

- Full-time student — enrolled for and completes 12 or more credit hours per term;
- Three-quarter-time student — enrolled for and completes 9 to 11 credit hours per term;
- Half-time student — enrolled for and completes 6 to 8 credit hours per term;
- Less-than-half-time student — enrolled for and completes 1 to 5 credit hours per term.

3. To maintain "satisfactory Progress" with full eligibility for financial aid, a student must successfully complete, each

term, the minimum number of credits for the category in which s/he enrolled with a grade point average of 2.0 or higher. Federal regulations also require that students achieve a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 by the end of their second academic year. Audited courses are not considered in determining financial-aid eligibility.

4. A student who fails during a given term to meet the above standards will be placed on financial-aid probation for the ensuing term of enrollment. Aid may be awarded during a probationary term; however, a probationary student who has completed his/her second academic year must complete the required number of credit hours with a grade point average sufficiently high to raise his/her cumulative GPA up to 2.0 before aid can be released for subsequent terms.

5. A student who fails to meet the minimum financial-aid eligibility standards for two successive terms will be placed on financial-aid suspension.

6. A student who has been suspended from financial-aid eligibility (at SUU or another institution) may be required to complete at least one term without financial aid before he/she can again receive financial aid. Upon successful completion of said term, the financial-aid eligibility of said student may be reinstated on a probationary basis. S/he will be required to successfully complete one additional term before unimpaired financial-aid eligibility will be restored.

7. Should a student withdraw from school during the course of a term, a refund/repayment calculation will be made and the withdrawing student may be required to repay a portion of the federal assistance received for personal expenses. Said student will be placed on financial-aid suspension until such repayment has been made and may be placed on financial-aid probation until he/she has completed a term in good standing.

8. A student who has attended SUU and has completed prior school terms without receiving financial aid, and who does not have a GPA of 2.0 or higher, will be placed on financial-aid probation during the first term in which financial-aid is received.

9. Students who do not receive financial aid are considered to be in good standing if they maintain a GPA of 2.0 or higher, and will become eligible for financial aid upon meeting the other eligibility criteria.

10. Transfer students from other institutions are eligible to apply for federal financial aid upon being academically admitted to SUU. Those with cumulative GPAs lower than 2.0 will be placed on financial-aid probation.

11. Federal regulations limit the term during which a student can receive Title IV aid. SUU students shall be allowed 153 "earned" semester hours (230 quarter hours) of financial-aid eligibility to complete the requirements for a bachelor's degree. In accordance with federal regulation (Federal Financial Aid Handbook p. 2-22), the standard is "cumulative" and credits earned without the receipt of financial aid or at other institutions must be counted.

12. To maintain satisfactory progress, students who receive financial aid for full-time attendance, who are working toward bachelor's degrees, must complete a minimum of one fifth of the requirements for a bachelor's degree in each academic

year. Students who attend part-time, and those who are working toward other certificates or degrees, must complete equivalent percentages of their programs in each academic year. A student who has not completed the required number of credit hours at the end of any academic year with a GPA of 2.0 or higher will be placed on financial-aid probation during the ensuing term. Should he/she fail to complete sufficient hours during the probationary term to eliminate the deficiency, his/her financial-aid eligibility will be suspended until the deficit is made up.

13. Incompletes must be completed within four weeks from the last day of final examinations of the affected term. Persons who fail to resolve incompletes within this period will not be able to use said credits to qualify retroactively for financial aid.

14. The status of each aid recipient will be monitored with respect to qualitative and quantitative satisfactory progress, and written notification will be sent to the last known address of those students who are placed on financial-aid probation or suspension. Probationary and suspension information will be included in financial-aid transcripts sent to other institutions.

15. A student may request an exception to any of the above policies by submitting a letter of appeal to the Financial Aid Review Committee. Said committee may grant, after careful review, exceptions due to mitigating circumstances deemed appropriate, such as illness, accident, death of a close relative, etc.

## **SCHOLARSHIPS**

Scholarships and awards are made to new, transfer and continuing students who compete successfully. Awards range from partial to full tuition for up to four years. Students receiving scholarships must complete a minimum of 30 semester hours per academic year.

The types of scholarships available include: academic, leadership, talent, private, and departmental. The State department of education also offers a Utah Career Teaching Scholarship through SUU's College of Education.

### **Types of Scholarships Explained**

#### **ACADEMIC-HONORS AT ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIP:**

Students who have maintained a 3.6 GPA in high school and have an ACT composite score of at least 26 are considered for this scholarship of full tuition.

#### **ACADEMIC-REGENTS SCHOLARSHIP:**

Students who do not qualify for other academic scholarships and who have high academic credentials are considered for this scholarship. Awards range in amounts from partial to full tuition.

#### **LEADERSHIP SCHOLARSHIP:**

These scholarships are designated for incoming freshman and transfer students with outstanding leadership ability who have excelled in high school or junior college student government and co-curricular activities.

## ATHLETIC AWARDS:

Top athletes selected by coaches of the athletic events SUU competes in are offered awards consistent with the national rules of events in which they compete.

## DEPARTMENTAL

Many scholarships are awarded by the academic departments to students with funds donated to the University. Some of these may exceed resident tuition and extend beyond one year.

## TERRELL H. BELL SCHOLARSHIPS:

These are awarded for four years of study to deserving Utah high school graduates who are expected to enter the teaching profession in the state of Utah and who maintain a 2.75 grade point average. These scholarships provide for payment of tuition and fees. Interested high school students should contact their principal or superintendent as needed about the scholarship. Interested university students can also contact the dean of the College of Education.

## RESIDENT WAIVER

Waivers awarded in amounts of full or half tuition to residents of Utah who meet academic, leadership or athletic requirements. Requirements are based on waiver availability and student accomplishments.

## NON-RESIDENT WAIVER

Waivers awarded to non-Utah residents who meet academic, leadership or athletic requirements. Typically, the waiver is the equivalent of the full in-state portion of tuition.

## Further Information

The number and complexity of financial aid opportunities at SUU permit only basic descriptions here. No attempt has been made in this catalog to provide comprehensive details or guidelines.

The awarding of financial aid to be given a student depends upon both the student's eligibility and the availability of funds. As funds are often insufficient to meet the need, the importance of on-time application cannot be overemphasized.
