

# STUDENT LIFE

Southern Utah University's Student Services staff supports the mission of the University by:

- Fostering a learning, growth environment for students and members of the University by providing quality services, individual and institutional support.
- Providing programs and services designed to acknowledge the value of each individual and through personal example promote fairness, integrity and professional growth.
- Encouraging students to develop personal skills and abilities to enhance their enjoyment of and success in life and by providing opportunities for students to broaden their social, cultural and intellectual perspectives.
- Offering programs which allow each student to receive the best possible education, to be stimulated to give service to others and to become responsible, caring members of society, their own families and individual communities.

Under the direction of the vice president for student services, a number of programs and services are offered to help students experience the learning opportunities set forth in the mission statement above.

## 1. EDUCATIONAL AND STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

### CAREER SERVICES

Career Services, in Sharwan Smith center 201, assists students and alumni with part-time/student employment; professional/career employment; education employment files; and career counseling.

- Job listings are provided through bulletin boards, binders, Web site, (<http://www.suu.edu/ss/career>) and E-mail distribution lists. Job listings include: part-time and professional job openings for students and graduates, as well as internship opportunities.
- Current elementary and secondary teachings positions, notices of education employment fairs and on-campus interviews are listed on the web site daily at <http://www.suu.edu/ss/career/internet/teacherjobs.html> From January to June, those wishing to receive the above mentioned information by mail can subscribe to the twice monthly *Teacher Education Bulletin* for \$3 per month.
- A career library with books, directories, and employer brochures, provides information on career choices, resume writing, interviewing skills, job search strategy, and company research.
- Career counseling, individually, in small groups and using the *Choices* computerized career planning program is available by appointment.

•Annual Career Fair and Summer Jobs/Internship Fair are open to all students each year.

•On-campus interviews with employer representatives are scheduled through Career Services.

•Job Search Workshops in a variety of areas are offered each semester.

•Job Search Skills/Strategy course is offered each semester: University Studies, UNIV 3200. Recommended for students within two semesters of graduation.

Career services personnel are happy to provide individual and group assistance; however, each person must assume primary responsibility for the achievement of his/her own employment goals, and must be willing to conduct thorough research, to prepare carefully, and to travel sufficiently to bring those goals to fruition.

### STUDENT DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The Student Development Center, located in the Sharwan Smith Center 169, offers services which help students adjust to college life, select college courses, identify career options and provide information and registration opportunities for a variety of tests.

### STUDENT DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

Professionally trained counselors and staff assist students with selecting an academic major, completing general education requirements and evaluating educational goals. In addition, advisers work with students in choosing appropriate fields of study and resolving personal issues that impact students' academic success.

The following courses are offered to assist students in their personal growth and skill development: UNIV 1310, Student Success, UNIV 1020, Career Decisions, UNIV 1010, University Orientation, a required class for all first-time university students. These courses are taught by counselors in the Student Development Center and other Student Services professionals.

Personal counseling services are offered on a short-term basis to help students resolve problems which may be interfering with their academic progress or personal growth. Students who need long-term therapy are referred to the Wellness Center on campus or to appropriate community resources. Students visiting the Student Development Center will receive professional assistance in a supportive and confidential atmosphere

### TESTING SERVICES

Tests which help indicate personality and career interests are available for students desiring assistance with educational, vocational, career and personal concerns. Testing arrangements can be made with the Student Development Center on an individual basis. computerized study programs are available to students preparing for ACT, GRE and GMAT. Student Development Center testing Services also

administer the General Educational Development Test (GED), the American Collegiate Test (ACT), Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), College-Level Exam Program (CLEP), the Graduate Record Exam (GRE), Dental College Admissions Test (DAT), Law School Admission Test (LSAT) and other national testing programs. Information and application forms for these exams are available in the Student Development Center.

## UNIVERSITY ORIENTATION

The transition to collegiate life can be a challenge. To help new students, particularly freshmen, adjust to college life, UNIV 1010, a comprehensive orientation program, serves the campus. Coordinated by the Student Development Center, University Orientation introduces new students to SUU. Moreover, this one-credit course is required of new freshmen prior to their first semester on campus. Orientation sessions are provided at a variety of times during the summer and before spring semester. The course acquaints students with the services, facilities, opportunities, and responsibilities of being a student at Southern Utah University.

## SCHOOL RELATIONS

Located in the Sharwan Smith Center, the school relations department performs several vital functions to SUU, which include giving campus tours, hosting overnight visitors at the University Hosting Center, producing campus publications and scholarship selection. School relations supervises the Admissions Adviser program, the Presidential Ambassadors program, the Governor's Honors Academy, Quest Leadership Seminars, various scholarship weekend programs (including Junior Honors Weekends, Multi-cultural Weekend, Ambassador Weekend, and Spring Leadership Weekends) and other recruitment and public relations functions.

School relations offers students the opportunity to get involved directly in the leadership aspect of the recruiting process. The presidential ambassadors, a student program designed to host dignitaries, special events for the President's Office, weekend events, give campus tours and aid in the recruitment of high school leaders, is a highly prestigious organization. Only a handful of SUU's most prominent students are selected to represent the institution in the ambassador program. Involvement within the program is selective, but open to any student who would like to become involved.

Campus tours are given Monday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Visiting the campus on an official tour is one of the best choices a prospective SUU student can make. Please call (435) 865-8360 or e-mail [tour@suu.edu](mailto:tour@suu.edu) several days in advance to schedule your tour.

The school relations department takes a personal role in the lives of new students by recruiting them but, more importantly, by helping them take the first step in their collegiate career.

## STUDENT SUPPORT CENTER

The Student Support Center, located on the second floor of

the Sharwan Smith Center, houses a unique combination of separate programs which work together to offer services to students. The five programs are: Multicultural Center, Student Support Services, Talent Search, Upward Bound and Disabled Student Services.

Each program within the Center is geared to helping students develop the personal, academic and professional skills they need to enhance individual growth, adjustment to college life, and career preparation.

### The Multicultural Center

The Multicultural Center provides personal, academic, financial and career counseling to ethnic minority students at SUU. Here, students are assisted in their adjustment to college life, and are encouraged to use the academic support services available on campus. The Center also serves as a liaison between various tribal, state and federal agencies.

To further enrich cultural understanding, the Center encourages the participation of all interested faculty, staff and students in various multicultural activities. The Native American Student Association, Students for Campus Diversity Club, and Polynesian Club co-sponsor special campus events such as the Miss Indian SUU Pageant, International Week, Black History Month, Native American Week and a Polynesian Luau. The staff of the Center is readily available for consultation, and coordinates numerous workshops, demonstrations, and displays dealing with international, Native American, African-American, Pacific Island and Hispanic cultures as a campus and community service. The Center also promotes the development of ethnic-oriented curriculum by furnishing lectures and workshops on minority cultures, languages, and current issues. The Center's cross-cultural books, tapes, records and videos are also available for check out.

A tutoring program, open to all students regardless of ethnic background, is jointly administered by the Multicultural Center and the Learning Center. Tutorial assistance is provided throughout the year in all major fields of study. Contact the Learning Center in ELC 114 for a tutoring schedule.

### Learning Success Support

A Learning Success specialist, housed within the Student Services, designs and develops programs to assist students in achieving success in course work and personal goals and to help student services departments in developing program services which enhance student success and retention. The Learning Success specialist may work with faculty and the staff to strengthen a positive learning environment on the campus. In conjunction with faculty and the Learning Center, the specialist may help implement programs which assist students in developing study strategies to enhance learning and achieve course mastery.

### Student Support Services

Student Support Services is funded through the U.S. Department of Education. This program is designed to provide equal access and opportunity to postsecondary education for educationally and economically disadvantaged

youth and students with disabilities.

Student Support Services provides identified SUU students developmental and college-level instruction and special services designed to increase their retention and graduation rates; to maximize their social, cultural and academic adjustment within the University environment; and to assist in the achievement of their academic and career goals. These services include developmental classes in English (ENGL 0900 and 0990) and in math (MATH 0900, 0920 and 0990), a Study Skills: Student Success course, UNIV 1310, tutorial services, and individualized academic and personal skills development.

### **Disabled Student Services**

The Americans with Disabilities Act and the Rehabilitation Act guarantee equal access, equal opportunity and non-discrimination for people with disabilities. SUU is committed to supporting both the intent and spirit of these laws. To identify and provide necessary support services as soon as possible, students with disabilities are encouraged to visit the Student Support Center as soon as they are admitted to Southern Utah University.

Disabled Student Services offers a comprehensive program of individualized services to accommodate the needs of students with disabilities. Typical services may include advocacy, textbooks on tape, notetakers, readers, priority registration and test taking accommodations. Students with disabilities are responsible for identifying themselves, providing appropriate documentation, and requesting reasonable accommodations. No diagnostic services are available through Disabled Student Services.

### **Talent Search**

Talent Search at Southern Utah University provides early intervention services to 600 southern Utah students in grades six through 12. Its purpose is to help students better understand their educational opportunities and options. Participants receive information about college admissions requirements, scholarships and various financial aid programs. Project activities include assessment of each participant's academic needs; ACT seminars, career and financial aid counseling; academic guidance, college tours and other activities to keep students in school and focused on career and college success. Talent Search is closely coordinated with the University's Upward Bound and Student Support Services.

### **Upward Bound**

Upward Bound serves students from high schools in southern Utah and northern Arizona. Twice each year these 100 students spend a weekend at SUU where they are given selected workshops in such topics as note taking, time management, critical thinking and financial aid. A six-week summer campus residential component with tutoring and counseling services throughout the school year is offered to these students to help them develop the skills and motivation needed for academic success in high school and entrance into postsecondary programs.

## **VETERANS' SERVICES**

Veterans attending SUU and pursuing a four-year degree or an AAS degree may receive benefits from the department of veterans' affairs.

Students who have completed at least 24 months of continuous active military service may be eligible for course credit. Please check with the SUU Veterans' Office listed below for an evaluation.

SUU participates with the veteran and the department of veterans' affairs in all educational benefits offered. Programs change; therefore, contact with the veterans' coordinator, SUU Registrar's Office, Sharwan Smith Center 166A, (435) 586-7715, is crucial to getting benefits in a timely manner.

## **WELLNESS CENTER**

Southern Utah University is committed to the total wellness concept of healthy social, physical, intellectual, career, and emotional growth. Wellness is a philosophy and way of life that encourages personal responsibility, a balanced lifestyle, environmental awareness and personal growth. The focus is on wellness and involvement in quality educational services in the campus community at SUU. The Wellness Center is made up of student health services, clinical counseling, alcohol, drug and violence educational programs and is responsible for the recreation and fitness center, along with intramural programs.

### **Policies, Procedures, and Information**

It is the Wellness Center policy to contribute to such primary physical and mental health as a student may require. The staff of the Wellness Center will continue to make special arrangements to accommodate all students as their needs become known. These services, as always, are private and confidential.

Students may take advantage of services provided by the Wellness Center by calling 586-7718 (8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday). In most cases, immediate care will be available as needed during the hours mentioned above.

The activities provided through the campus recreation office or program, under the supervision of the Wellness Center, are designed to provide opportunities for all students, faculty and staff to exercise, socialize, and be participants in a variety of healthy and possible life long activities.

### **Student Health Services**

#### *Examinations/Consultations*

Student health services are provided for all registered students at SUU. Student health services are located in the Wellness Center in the Sharwan Smith Center. A receptionist and registered nurse are on duty from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., weekdays, during fall and spring semesters. Summer hours are 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. A licensed health provider will be at the clinic daily for consultation by appointment. Illness or accidents requiring laboratory, x-ray, suturing, or casting will be referred to a physician in the community or to the Valley View Medical Center Emergency Department. Any further care beyond what student health service can render must be

paid for by the student or his/her insurance company at customary rates.

In the event of an illness or injury when the health service is not open, students should call a qualified physician. Emergencies outside of the Wellness Center or for medical transportation, call 911. All emergencies should be referred to the Valley View Medical Center, 595 South 75 East, Cedar City. The telephone number is 586-6587 or call 911.

#### *Student Health and Accident Insurance*

A health and accident policy for students who carry six or more credit hours is available and may be purchased at the time of registration by paying the premium at the cashier's office. This insurance plan is especially designed for student protection against costly medical expenses for injury or illness. Brochures regarding the terms, deductible, and costs of insurance for students and dependents of students may be received by calling (435) 586-7718, or by coming to the Wellness Center, room 168, in the Sharwan Smith Center.

#### **Clinical Counseling**

The office of clinical counseling provides in-depth counseling and psychotherapy to single or married students for a broad spectrum of needs. Therapy is provided by a psychologist licensed to practice in the state of Utah.

#### **Alcohol, Drug and Violence Education and Prevention Program**

An alcohol, drug and violence education and prevention program is provided by the health and clinical counseling services located in the Wellness Center. This service is extended to students, faculty and staff to provide accurate and up-to-date information on alcohol, drug and violence related programs and issues. The program takes a proactive position on prevention, early intervention, referral treatment, seeks community support, and collaborates with respective prevention programs.

Used within the context of educational tradition, the intent of the program is to encourage informed choices and the exercise of personal responsibility as applied to the use/misuse of alcohol, drugs and violence prevention.

## **2. STUDENT ACTIVITIES AND ORGANIZATIONS**

### THE OFFICE OF STUDENT ACTIVITIES

Recognizing the value of extracurricular life in the growth of the student, the University encourages participation in the many and varied opportunities available on campus. Through such participation, students achieve the qualities of social leadership and a perspective of values which help prepare them for the challenges of a rewarding life.

The office of student activities, located in the Sharwan Smith Center, cooperates closely with the Southern Utah University Student Association (SUUSA) and other student groups. The director of student activities is available to assist students with both general and specific organizational challenges. The director also promotes social leadership skills and decision-

making techniques that are valuable to campus life and the future growth of each individual student.

The office coordinates the efforts of student government, sponsors specific student activities and generally serves students in ways that will enhance their collegiate experience at SUU. Listed below are some of the opportunities available for student activity involvement.

### STUDENT GOVERNMENT

The leadership of the SUUSA is separated into three branches: executive, legislative, and judicial. The purpose of student government is to provide opportunities for student involvement, leadership development and to plan and implement successful activities that meet the social and academic needs of students.

The student government leaders are anxious to complement the academic life of SUU students through the programs and activities they sponsor. Many opportunities exist for students to assist in the activities organized by student government. Please visit the leaders in the Student Activities Office to enrich your collegiate experience.

#### EXECUTIVE BRANCH—Executive Council

Under the direction of the student body president, the executive council will "make a difference" in the quality of collegiate life for the students at SUU. The council not only sponsors social activities but provides other services, such as assistance to off-campus tenants, cultural awareness, internship opportunities, and support of student organizations.

#### LEGISLATIVE BRANCH—SUUSA Senate

The SUUSA Senate is comprised of 15 elected senators, three from each College of the University. The academic vice president is president of the senate.

The senate allocates funds to student clubs and organizations on campus and approves all allocations of student fees.

#### JUDICIAL BRANCH—Judicial Council

The judicial council consists of a chief justice and four associate justices. The jurisdiction of the council shall extend to all cases regarding the SUUSA constitution. It shall rule on election by-laws and parking appeals.

### STUDENT CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

SUU offers many opportunities for students to become involved on campus. Its 48 student clubs and organizations fulfill many purposes and individual needs: cultural, professional, recreational, religious, service and social.

#### **Greek Organizations**

The campus Greek organizations provide students a cohesive group that shares similar values. Greek organizations on campus include the following: Alpha Phi, Delta Psi Omega, Sigma Nu, Sigma Chi and Zeta Tau Alpha. Going Greek at SUU means that students are committed to serving their community, have the abilities to become leaders, and maintain a strong focus on academics.

## Service Center

SUU's Service Center is committed to providing students an opportunity to learn from community service. The office provides, in conjunction with Student Government, a number of opportunities to serve the community and to learn from these experiences. The Service Center staff meets once a week to plan major service events. The Center plans an alternative Spring Break for students who want to spend their Spring Break serving others.

## THE SHARWAN SMITH CENTER

The Sharwan Smith Center serves as the campus hub for students, faculty and staff and includes a cafeteria, bookstore, snack bar, fitness center, game room, post office and food court. Additionally, the offices of Student Government and Student Activities are located in the Sharwan Smith Center.

The University encourages the use of Sharwan Smith Center facilities for workshops, conventions, meetings, or other academically related events.

The Center also includes a movie theatre where a variety of films are shown at a nominal cost throughout the year.

## INTRAMURAL SPORTS/OPEN RECREATION

The intramural/open recreation program is a function of the Wellness Center. The program is developed and managed under the direction of the coordinator of campus recreation. There are work opportunities for officials, score keepers, lifeguards, facility supervisors and instructors for this program.

The Intramural program is provided for the benefit of the SUU campus community. A wide variety of team and individual sports are offered. Such activities as flag football, basketball, softball, volleyball, tennis, racquetball and golf are just a few of the events offered. The campus community has access to open recreation which includes the gymnasium, swimming pool and the weight room in the P. E. Building. Aerobics and water aerobics are also available. Information is available through the office of campus recreation or by calling 586-7774.

## FITNESS CENTER

The Fitness Center, located in the Sharwan Smith Center, boasts some of the finest state-of-the-art equipment available. A combination of stair climbers, treadmills, single station exercise equipment and free weights offers opportunity to the novice as well as the experienced lifter. Students can either enroll in PE 1700 or purchase a monthly or semester membership to access the facilities. Fees are handled by the Cashier's Office. For hours and rates call 865-8211.

## BOOKSTORE

Owned and operated by the University, the SUU Bookstore is located in the Sharwan Smith Center. It is the official University source for all required books and supplies. This self-service store has been designed to provide students and faculty with a central location for the purchase of the items

needed for day-to-day college activities. The Bookstore also stocks a complete assortment of art and computer supplies, stationery and sundries. It provides buyback services at the end of each semester on most textbooks. The store is open 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. on Saturday. Summer hours are 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. on Saturday. The Bookstore web page is located at [www.suu.edu](http://www.suu.edu) under Student Life. ## C-STORE

Under the Sun C-store is located in the Sharwan Smith Center across the hall from the SUU Bookstore. It provides convenience and quick access for students, faculty, and staff members on campus. Offering choices from drinks, snacks, film, and health aids to popcorn, pretzels and fudge, the C-store is open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday.

## SHARWAN SMITH CENTER PROGRAMMING

Under the direction of the Sharwan Smith Center manager, a number of entertaining, cultural, and educational events of major importance are made available to students each year through special arrangement by student, staff, and community groups. They bring to SUU an array of nationally known musical and entertainment organizations, including bands, dramatic groups, and individual performers. The music department also sponsors an annual series of programs featuring student groups and solo and chamber music groups.

The Sharwan Smith Center manager works with and provides off-campus programming for students not living in Resident Housing. This programming offers the unique opportunity for lifelong learning skills to be available for the students not having ready access to the campus and provides on-campus interaction. In cooperation with an advisory board, the Sharwan Smith Center manager promotes social leadership skills, and decision making techniques that are valuable to campus life and the future growth of each individual student.

To schedule rooms in the Sharwan Smith Center, students, faculty, staff and community are to visit with the Sharwan Smith Center manager to check on dates, times and the rooms most agreeable for their purposes. It is the manager's responsibility to ensure that every necessary need is met and to anticipate requests to the best of that office's abilities and resources.

## CONVOCATIONS

Designed to promote personal growth by introducing speakers and artists of national and international reputation, the SUU Convocations Series is a weekly lecture program. The series is offered for credit (UNIV 2010) and is free to interested students and community members. Generally held in the SUU Auditorium, weekly attendance averages more than 500.

SUU students serve as active members of the Convocations Committee. In this role they work with faculty

and staff to create programming that stimulates intellectual inquiry and thought-provoking dialogue about current topics of critical concern to students. Discussion often continues long after the Thursday lecture. Guest presenters often visit classes and meet with clubs and student organizations. Guest speakers include political figures, scientists, educators, business entrepreneurs, actors and others. Recent guests have included Gerald Molen, producer of *Jurassic Park* and *Schindler's List*, actors Gordon Jump and Karl Malden, Nobel Laureate Betty Williams, *The Mozart Effect* author Don Campbell, spiritual leader Matthew Fox and advertising critic Jean Kilbourne. Each program offers students new insights and perspectives, thus enhancing the collegiate experience.

## STUDENT PUBLICATIONS

The *University Journal* student newspaper serves the campus of SUU. Published in tabloid form on Monday and Thursday during the academic year and bi-weekly during the summer, the *Journal* includes the latest in student news and opinion. It includes a website accessible through the SUU Homepage

Any student is invited to gain valuable career experience and/or to foster beneficial interpersonal skills by working on the *Journal*. Positions are filled each semester in news, photography and art as well as in production, circulation and marketing. Freshmen are welcome. The *Journal* offices are located on the bottom floor of the Technology Building.

The *Kolob Canyon Review* is a literary magazine which features poetry, short fiction and essays and which provides a forum for the creativity of students. With funding from the SUUSA, the magazine receives advisement from the language and literature department and is published each semester.

*Tailwind* is a literary magazine which features work of faculty and professional writers. Published annually, it is now in its 18th year of existence, and receives advisement from the language and literature department .

*The Ymbsittendra Journal* is published by the language and literature department as a vehicle for students to write academic papers on the subject of English.

## SOCIAL STANDARDS

Students attending SUU are expected to maintain a high standard of ethical and moral conduct and to uphold the laws of the University and the state and federal governments. Students are expected to demonstrate maturity in their judgments and assume responsibility for their actions.

Southern Utah University does not permit alcoholic beverages on the campus, at University-sponsored functions off-campus, or at any activity sponsored by a group chartered by the SUU Student Association. Additionally, the University does not permit the illegal use or possession of drugs by its students, whether on- or off-campus. Violators are subject to disciplinary action.

Any student who has been suspended or declared ineligible because of low scholarship or inappropriate behavior may have the right to appeal through appropriate procedures. The office of the Vice President for Student

Services can assist a student with more detailed information.

## 3. HOUSING AND RESIDENCE LIFE

### HOUSING

SUU students are offered a variety of convenient living and eating arrangements. University residence halls are located on campus, and they provide housing as economically priced as possible. Hall directors and resident advisers are located in each residence hall to assist students.

Students make application for housing by writing to Housing and Residence Life Office, Southern Utah University, P.O. Box 8998, Cedar City, Utah 84720. After the applicant receives the official application form, it is completed and returned to the Housing and Residence Life Office with the indicated deposit and housing application fee. Confirmation and additional information regarding housing will be sent immediately after receipt of the application and deposit.

The exact move-in date and a check list of items needed will be mailed to students at least one month before check-in. Roommate assignments will be available two weeks prior to check-in.

Assignment and placement in housing does not serve as admission to the University. Official admission forms are to be obtained and processed as outlined in admission procedures.

### SINGLE STUDENT HOUSING

Juniper Hall and Manzanita Court are single student facilities. They are designed so individual sections or entire buildings can be assigned to either men or women as needed.

### JUNIPER HALL

Juniper Hall accommodates 256 students. There are single rooms, double rooms, and Super Single rooms available. Students living in Juniper Hall do not have to pay extra for power, water, sewer, garbage, heat, A/C, telephone, television, Internet access, and e mail.

Super Single rooms are large private rooms which come standard with two wardrobes, two study desks, one bed, a combination microwave and refrigerator/freezer (Micro-Fridge) unit, and a student's own personal computer hooked up to the campus network at no extra charge. These rooms are very popular and those interested should make reservations early to secure one of these.

Juniper students furnish their own bed linens, blankets, bedspreads, pillows, towels, cleaning supplies, and other personal items. Juniper students are required to purchase one of three flexible meal plans. Studies have shown that students eating their meals on campus have more time to study and generally do better academically than their counterparts who do not eat on campus.

## MANZANITA COURT

Manzanita Court has apartment facilities for 184 students. Six students share a three-bedroom apartment with a kitchen-living room. Each building has two lounges, and each bedroom has two single (twin size) beds, study area, individual closets with drawers, and shelf space. The kitchen-living room is equipped with built-in cupboards, sink, range, refrigerator, microwave, and table and chairs.

Residents in Manzanita must furnish their own cooking and eating utensils, as well as small appliances. They may elect to purchase a flexible meal plan from the cafeteria. Students must provide their own bed linens, blankets, pillows, bedspreads, towels, cleaning supplies and other personal items. Cost per semester includes all utilities. Television and game lounges as well as laundry rooms are located in Manzanita Court.

## 4. FOOD SERVICES

SUU food services are located in the Sharwan Smith Center and provide meals and snack items to students, staff and faculty as well as catering services.

Students who contract to live in Juniper Hall also contract for meals in the SUU food service.

Thunderbird Circle Dining furnishes meals, snack items and fountain drinks. Food Court venues, including the T-Bird Grill, also offer food and beverages. The Country Store furnishes snack items, soft drinks and specialty coffees.

Students, faculty and the community may use the catering services for banquets, refreshments, parties and other events.

Meal tickets are available to students who do not live in Juniper Hall.

The Sharwan Smith Center also houses a retail outlet, Hogi Yogi, which offers sandwiches, drinks and snacks, including frozen yogurt. Students may use their meal cards for this service.

## 5. ATHLETICS

### MEN'S/WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

For both spectators and competitors, the athletic program offers a wide variety of opportunities to SUU students.

SUU competes in the Mid-Continent Conference. Men compete in basketball, golf, cross country, track and field and baseball. Women compete in basketball, softball, tennis, cross country and track and field. The football and gymnastics teams compete as NCAA Independents. A full schedule of games and competitions is maintained in each of these activities.

SUU student-athletes enjoy excellent overall athletic facilities. The Eccles Coliseum includes fields for football and track and field, with a new NCAA-standard track. Within the Coliseum complex is the Jay Dee Harris and Alice C. Harris Center, which houses the intercollegiate athletics department and the University's gymnastic program. East of the Coliseum are recreation grounds and the baseball and softball parks. The Centrum, SUU's combination special events center and classroom facility, houses 5,300 chair back seats for basketball, gymnastics and other indoor sporting events. Six tennis courts are located south of the Harris Center. The racquetball courts and large, all-weather practice areas of the Physical Education Building are also nearby. Skiing facilities are 40 minutes away.

Information on sports eligibility and financial aid is available through the Office of Intercollegiate Athletics.

# ACADEMIC SERVICES

## LIBRARY

The mission of the Gerald R. Sherratt Library is to ensure access to global information within a personalized learning environment by collecting, organizing, preserving, disseminating and creating information for the university community. The role of the library is to actively stimulate the optimum use of information resources in support of the university curriculum, student and faculty research, and public service. Unique to our mission is (1) the support of superior teaching through faculty development, academic grants and contracts, and instructional media services (2) the preservation of and access to our artistic and cultural heritage and (3) the training of instructional media specialists.

The Library, a \$10.4 million, 80,500 square foot, state-of-the-art facility was opened in March 1996. Linked to other libraries throughout the United States and world, the library provides materials and services to support the university curriculum in bringing students, faculty, librarians, and technology together. The on-line catalog and computer bibliographic indexes provide instant access to the library's collection and to additional resources all over the world. These materials and services are available to all SUU students, faculty and staff who have a valid SUU I.D. card. A yearly patron card may be purchased at the circulation desk by patrons who wish to use the library and are not affiliated with the University.

The Information Commons on the main level houses nearly 45 computer workstations where students may access the library collection on-line, seek reference assistance, or consult electronic databases through the library's integrated system. An optical fiber network operates within the building and connects the campus to global resources through the Internet and the World Wide Web. On-line access to approximately 4,000 periodicals, many of them full-text, complements the in-house periodical collection of 1,100 titles. Also located on the main level are the circulation desk, a copy center, the reserve library, and the serials and journals area. In addition to data access in this area, the library has computer ports available on the upper floors for student laptop use. The library offers interlibrary loan service through a computerized network of more than 3,000 participating libraries throughout the nation. This service provides patrons with desired books and journal articles not available at SUU.

On the top two floors, the Sherratt Library houses 200,000 volumes (building to a capacity of 260,000 volumes) that support the core collection in a variety of academic fields. Federal and state government documents are available in the stacks and on-line. Textbooks and other materials used in teacher education are in the curriculum library, while the juvenile collection contains fiction and non-fiction of particular importance to prospective teachers.

The Jon and Karen Huntsman Reading Room, a two-story sky-lit rotunda on the second level is designed with table seating for study and for use of library materials. Study space on the top floor overlooks this vast reading room as well as the north side of the campus and the north valley. More than 1,200 study stations are available overall. Ten

study rooms where students may work in pairs or small groups are available on the upper two floor of the building. Traditional library carrels, study tables, and lounge furniture are integrated into the library.

On the Garden level, Special Collections contains materials that are rare, expensive, or in need of special handling. The Christopher/Mann Reading Room provides a serene setting in which to examine materials about SUU, southern Utah, Shakespeare and the humanities. Located in Special Collections are the Seymour Room, the Palmer Room and the Tanner Room. The Seymour Room, with its authentic Victorian furniture, and the Seymour Collection provide valuable materials in opera, drama, literature and language. The Palmer Room and collection contain valuable material about the Paiute Indians and southern Utah.

Two electronic classrooms on this level will provide an environment for instruction in information retrieval skills and contemporary library research. The non-print collection, containing material in a wide of variety of media formats, is also located on this level.

The *Garden of Symbols*, located on the Garden level was created by David Phillips of Cambridge, Massachusetts, and funded by the Utah 1% for Art Program. The Garden depicts symbols as communication through time. Water seeps from two sandstone spires that are visible from the entry level and the Garden level.

Sherratt Library hours are Monday through Thursday, 7 a.m. to 11 p.m.; Friday, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.; Saturday, 9 to 5 p.m.; Sunday, 2 p.m. to 10 p.m. When school is not in session the hours are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

## THE GRACE A. TANNER CENTER FOR HUMAN VALUES

The Grace A. Tanner Center for Human Values, directed by Eugene T. Woolf, is located on the Garden level of the Gerald R. Sherratt Library.

The purpose of the center is to provide a focal point and a physical setting for the Grace A. Tanner Lecture in Human Values—a lecture program funded at Southern Utah University by the Tanner Trust for Utah Universities through the generosity of Professor Obert C. Tanner and Mrs. Grace A. Tanner—and other such activities as the center may choose to sponsor.

The Tanner Center seeks to promote access to the scholarly and scientific learning in all areas of human values, which embraces moral, artistic, intellectual, and spiritual concepts.

The resources of the Tanner Room, including the Tanner Philosophical Library, provides a focal point for the pursuit of these ideas.

The primary orientation of the center is philosophical, but special care is taken to include for discussion the full range of values pertinent to the human condition, provided by other disciplines.

The lectures are printed in handsomely bound volumes or taped for video presentation, and become a permanent part of the Tanner Room collection. Orders for the lectures have come from several states as well as from many foreign countries.

In addition to the annual Tanner lecture, center activities include sponsorship of the Distinguished Faculty Lecture

and the annual Grace A. Tanner Scholarship, covering tuition and fees for a full year. The goal of the center is to encourage maximum exposure of students, faculty and the larger community to the ideas which best exemplify the human condition and the values which help to define it.

#### INSTRUCTIONAL MEDIA SERVICES

The Instructional Media Center (IMC) is located on the second level of the Electronic Learning Center and furnishes media support services, equipment, and supplies for the instructional activities of students, faculty and staff. Included here are a copy center, a printing center and a production lab. Audio visual equipment is available for loan. IMC hours are Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Saturday, noon to 3 p.m.; Sunday, 5 to 8 p.m.

#### THE LEARNING CENTER

The Learning Center is designed to help SUU students enjoy academic success while becoming independent learners. Peer tutoring in many subjects is one of the most utilized Learning Center services. Tutors are available at no charge. Testing services are available including proctoring of exams for instructors. The center is located in the Electronic Learning Center, room 114. Learning Center hours are Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m.-8 p.m.; Friday, 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

#### BOOKSTORE

Owned and operated by the University, the SUU Bookstore is located in the Sharwan Smith Center. It is the official University source for all required books and supplies. This self-service store has been designed to provide students and faculty with a central location for the purchase of the items needed for day-to-day college activities. The Bookstore also stocks a complete assortment of art and computer supplies, stationery, and sundries. The store is open 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. on Saturday. Summer hours are 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. Saturday.

#### COMPUTING AND COMMUNICATION SERVICES

Computers and other instructional technologies have become essential tools for instruction and learning in every college and department at SUU. The University provides a variety of equipment and services to meet the computing needs of students, faculty and staff. Every SUU student can acquire a computing account for e-mail and other computing services. Proof of current registration is required to obtain computer accounts.

Educational services to assist faculty and students include on-line tutorials, videotaped and written materials, and noncredit seminars. Full-time and student consultants help users work with the academic computing systems, microcomputers, and supported software.

The division of information technology provides the following general services:

**National and Local Communications Networks.** Access to campus computing and electronic mail facilities is available to the University community. Services include access to Internet, a collection of local, regional, and international networks that use the Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol (TCP/IP). SUU supports a World-Wide Web server and home page that provides campus information to network users.

**VAX 6420.** This Digital Equipment Corporation mainframe runs the VMS interactive operating system. Software on the VAX consists of student services and administrative applications, programming languages, and other uses. The VAX is networked with other campus systems for data transfers and access to output devices.

**Microcomputers.** More than 350 Apple, IBM and IBM-compatible microcomputers are available for students. All microcomputers are linked to local area networks. The microcomputers are equipped with a variety of software, including word processors, spreadsheets, databases, programming languages, and graphics applications, among others. All networks provide draft and laser printers and centralized software access.

Advanced applications in visualization and geographic information systems (GIS) continue to develop at SUU. For patrons of the Library, data- and knowledge-bases available nationally in CD-ROM, on-line, and other formats are typically available for SUU students. The Library is fully automated and operates its own systems, interconnected with the University network.

#### RADIO/TV FACILITIES

Meeting the SUU need for mass communication are a number of campus services. A licensed FM-radio station, KSUU-FM, is the radio voice of the University, and it functions as part of the broadcasting curriculum in the communication department. The station is on the air 16 hours a day, six days each week. Programming consists of educational features, news, recorded music and network presentations. The communication department also programs Channel 9 on the local cable television system. Programming on SUTV consists of SUU sports, regular newscasts, educational material, interview programs and material from the arts.

#### POST OFFICE

A post office station is located in the Sharwan Smith Center for student and faculty mail. Boxes may be rented quarterly or yearly. With the exception of passports, money orders, full U.S. mail services, FedEx and UPS services are available. The post office is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

#### ADVANCEMENT OFFICE

One of the keys to SUU's growth and development is its relationship with the alumni and friends of the University. Within the Advancement Office of the University, there are three important departments: alumni and development, which strengthen the institution's ties to its constituency and

develop resources to enhance the academic environment on campus; and the Utah Summer Games, which works to provide quality participation opportunities and to encourage healthy lifestyles among all residents of the state.

### **Development**

The Development Office oversees the fundraising efforts of the University. Through these efforts, the University seeks to obtain resources through the annual fund, corporations and foundations, grants and contracts, athletic development, planned gifts and major gifts.

The Development Office also conducts such special events as phonathons, Presidential Retreats, Old Main Society inductions, scholarship luncheons, estate planning seminars and special resource development campaigns.

The Development Office provides the vital margin of difference toward enhancing the quality of services and programs of the University by generating private and public resources for the University.

### **Alumni**

The Alumni Relations Office of the University is charged with strengthening the relationship between the University and its alumni and friends. The University also sponsors the SUU Alumni Association for all students who have attended the University for two or more academic terms or who have served as faculty or staff of the University. The Alumni Association assists actively in SUU commencement activities and also supports the SUU Student Alumni Association, an organization that sponsors activities for current students.

The Alumni Association is governed by the SUU National Alumni Board, a volunteer board that conducts numerous campus sponsored events such as Homecoming, chapter activities, reunions and regional receptions. The Alumni Association is informed of University events and special happenings through the *Alumni News of Southern Utah University*, an official publication of SUU, as well as through the establishment of regional alumni chapters throughout the state and region. The Alumni Office is located in the J. Reuben Clark Jr. Alumni House.

### **The Utah Summer Games**

Founded in 1986, the Utah Summer Games is a multi-sport festival which offers Olympic-style competition to the state's amateur athletes of all ages and abilities. A charter member of the National Congress of State Games, the USG was among the first of what is now more than 40 states to hold state games. Finals competitions in the Games are held each June in and around Cedar City, with SUU serving as host to the annual opening ceremonies as well as numerous finals events in the Games' three dozen sports.

The mission of the Utah Summer Games is to provide Utah residents with a wholesome avenue for positive personal development through sports and physical activity, to recognize dedication and achievement, to provide all residents with an opportunity to utilize quality sports facilities, and to create an amateur sports network of administrators and volunteers throughout Utah to further the development of grassroots amateur athletic programs. The USG is endorsed by the U.S. Olympic Committee as a grassroots Olympic sports festival, and has proven to be an important facet of the University's overall educational quest.

### **THE BRAITHWAITE FINE ARTS GALLERY**

The Braithwaite Fine Arts Gallery was completed in January 1976 and named in honor of Dr. Royden C. Braithwaite, who served as president of the University from 1955 to 1978. The gallery is a cultural resource center for the visual arts, serving a broad rural geographic region.

A variety of exhibitions is presented continuously throughout the year. Important state, regional and national exhibitions, organized by a variety of institutions, are presented. Faculty and student exhibitions are also held, along with illustrated lectures, art demonstrations, art films and related special events. The gallery's hours are Monday through Friday from noon to 7 p.m.
