

FEES & FINANCIAL AID

Tuition and Fees

Tuition is set by the Utah State Legislature, and fees are determined by the University administration and the State Board of Regents. The administration and board reserve the right to change tuition and fees as necessary. The following information is current as of the date of publication.

Tuition and fees will be assessed to all students including extended day school students and summer school students according to the following schedules. Extended day school and daytime credit hours are combined in assessing tuition. The two sessions of summer school are considered as one semester. *All students who attend summer school pay in-state tuition. Tuition and fees are payable at the time of registration.*

Students who have questions regarding their residence status should inquire at the Admissions Office.

Students registered for three or more credit hours in any regular academic semester daytime or evening class for credit may receive a student activity card.

Charges for non-credit or other continuing education classes shall be as stated in the extended day school and summer school bulletins.

All students are obligated to pay their fees at the time of registration. The Cashier's Office hours are from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays. Financial arrangements for payment of fees are the responsibility of the student.

All students registering for physical education activity courses are expected to provide themselves with gymnasium shoes and suits, and such other equipment as is required. Some equipment may be rented from the physical education department.

Students are held responsible for any damage done by them to University property.

Late Payment Fee:

A fee for late payment of amounts due the University will be assessed in the amount of \$15 per week that the amount remains unpaid beginning after the first week of classes.

The University reserves the right to unregister students for nonpayment of tuition and fees and to withhold registration, grades, transcripts and diplomas for nonpayment of obligations to SUU.

Instruction, Laboratory & Class Fees

Some classes require fees in addition to standard tuition and fees. The class schedule indicates such lab and course fees.

and are considered to be the primary source of federal assistance. At the present time, the Pell program is open ended and all students who qualify may receive a grant.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants

To qualify, students must have "exceptional need." FSEOG funds are very limited and are awarded, to Pell Grant recipients, on a first-come, first-served basis.

Federal Work-Study provides part-time jobs for undergraduate and graduate students with financial need, allowing them to earn money to help pay education expenses. The program encourages community service work and work related to the recipient's course of study. A FWS job can help a student gain valuable work experience in a chosen field of study before leaving school.

Leveraging Educational Assistance Partnership is a program consisting of federal grants given to states which are matched and distributed between institutions to be awarded to students. Funding is limited and individual student grants are restricted to Utah residents with special needs.

Federal Family Education Loans

Loans made under the Federal Family Education Loan Program are funded by financial institutions and guaranteed by the federal government. The federal government pays the interest on Subsidized Stafford Loans until six months after the student leaves school. Unsubsidized Stafford loans are essentially the same but there are no interest subsidies. PLUS (Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students) are guaranteed by the federal government. Repayment begins within 60 days after the loan is fully disbursed. FFEL program loans are available to all qualifying applicants.

Federal Perkins Loans are made through the University to qualifying students. The federal government pays the interest on Perkins Loans until nine months after the student leaves school. Perkins funds are limited.

Short-term Loans are made to students to meet immediate school-related needs while federal aid or personal funding is forthcoming. These loans are made from funds contributed by private donors and must be repaid within the semester. As with other aid programs, applicants must maintain satisfactory academic progress to qualify.

SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS

To be eligible to receive federal financial assistance or a University short-term loan while attending Southern Utah University, a student must be enrolled at least half time*, be in good standing, and maintain satisfactory academic progress through a course of study toward a certificate or degree. A student must also be a citizen of the United States or an eligible non-citizen.

1. Financial Aid categories of enrollment for undergraduate students are:

- a. Full-time student—enrolled for 12 or more credit hours per term.
- b. Three-quarter-time student—enrolled for nine to 11 credit hours per term.

- c. Half-time student—enrolled for six to eight credit hours per term.
- d. Less-than-half-time student—enrolled for one to five credit hours per term.

2. "Good standing" means a student is academically qualified to continue in attendance, and is in compliance with the accepted and approved enrollment standards and practices of both the university and the federal financial aid programs.

3. To maintain satisfactory academic progress with full eligibility for financial aid, students must successfully complete, each term, the minimum number of credits for the category in which they were initially enrolled with a minimum GPA of 2.0. Federal regulations also require that students achieve a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 by the end of their second academic year. Repeat courses may not count as earned credit hours for financial aid purposes and should be taken in addition to the number of credit hours used to determine a student's financial aid award. Audited courses are not considered in determining financial aid eligibility. Incomplete grades must be completed within four weeks from the last day of class instruction.

4. Students who earn credit but do not complete the minimum number of credits for the category in which they were initially enrolled with a minimum GPA of 2.0 will be placed on financial aid probation. Financial aid may be awarded during a probationary term.

5. Students failing to meet the minimum financial aid eligibility standards for two successive terms will be placed on financial aid suspension. However, students who earn zero credit hours during a term of enrollment in which financial aid was disbursed will be placed on financial aid suspension.

6. Students suspended from financial aid eligibility (at SUU or another institution) will be required to complete at least one term without financial aid before regaining financial aid eligibility. Upon successful completion of said term, the financial aid eligibility may be reinstated on a probationary basis. Students will be required to successfully complete one additional term before unimpaired financial aid eligibility will be restored.

7. In addition to being on financial aid suspension, students withdrawing from school and earning zero credit hours during the course of a term may be required to repay a portion of the federal assistance received.

8. Students who have attended prior school terms without receiving financial aid and who do not have a minimum GPA of 2.0 will be placed on financial aid probation during the first term in which financial aid is received.

9. Transfer students are eligible to apply for federal financial aid upon being academically admitted to SUU. Those students who have a cumulative GPA lower than 2.0 will be placed on financial aid probation.

10. Under federal regulations, SUU students shall be allowed 183 "earned" semester hours of financial aid eligibility to complete the requirements for a bachelor's degree. In accordance with Federal regulations, the standard is "cumulative" and credits earned without the receipt of financial aid or at other institutions must be counted. However, upon reaching 145 earned credit hours, students will be required to complete a financial-aid eligibility extension request form detailing the courses that will be

taken to complete their degree within the 183 credit hour limit. The request must be submitted to and approved by the financial aid review committee before financial aid can be disbursed.

11. The status of each aid recipient will be monitored for satisfactory academic progress and written notification will be sent to the last known address of those students who are placed on financial aid probation or suspension. Probation and suspension information will be included in financial aid information sent to other institutions.

12. A student may request an exception to any of the above policies, due to extenuating circumstances, by submitting an appeal to the financial aid review committee. The appeal must include a letter of explanation and supporting documentation and a completed financial aid suspension advising form.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships and awards are made to new, transfer and continuing students who compete successfully. Awards range from partial to full tuition for up to four years. Students receiving scholarships must complete a minimum of 24 semester hours per academic year.

The types of scholarships available include: academic, leadership, talent, private, and departmental. The State department of education also offers a Utah Career Teaching Scholarship through SUU's College of Education.

ACADEMIC SCHOLARSHIPS

Academic scholarships are awarded to incoming freshman who have shown commitment to academic excellence. Recipients will receive a full or partial resident tuition scholarship for up to four years.

DEPARTMENTAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Departmental scholarships are awarded by the academic departments to deserving students. Some of these may exceed resident tuition and extend beyond one year. Eligibility requires completed admissions and scholarship applications, specification of area applying for and exceptional knowledge within the academic department.

JUNIOR HONORS SCHOLARSHIPS

Recipients of the Junior Honors Scholarship are selected from participants at Junior Honors Scholarship Weekends. Scholarships will be awarded based on cumulative GPA, transcript evaluation, ACT/SAT scores, resume, and visits with SUU staff/faculty. A minimum 3.5 GPA and 22 ACT score are required for scholarship consideration. Recipients will receive half or full resident tuition scholarship for one year.

LEADERSHIP SCHOLARSHIPS:

Leadership scholarships are awarded to students with outstanding Leadership ability who have excelled in high school or college/university student governments, club organizations, community services and other co-curricular activities. A minimum GPA of 3.2 is required for scholarship consideration. Recipients will receive a full or partial resident tuition scholarship for up to four years renewable each year based upon academic performance.

MULTICULTURAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Multicultural scholarships are awarded to multicultural students who attend SUU's Multicultural Weekend. Recipients will receive a full or partial resident tuition scholarship for four years renewable each year based upon academic performance.

PRESIDENTIAL AMBASSADOR SCHOLARSHIPS

Presidential Ambassador scholarships are awarded to outstanding leaders who have excelled in school, community and personal leadership.

STERLING SCHOLAR SCHOLARSHIPS

Sterling Scholar scholarships are awarded to regional winners and runners-up if the student has a high school GPA of 3.5 or higher and an ACT or equivalent SAT score of 25 or higher. To be eligible, students must list that they are a regional Sterling Scholar and the area they competed in on the scholarship application and complete an admissions application to SUU.

UTAH CAREER TEACHING SCHOLARSHIPS

Utah Career Teaching Scholarships are awarded for four years of study to deserving Utah high school graduates who are entering the teaching profession in the state of Utah and who maintain a 2.75 GPA. These scholarships provide for payment of tuition and fees. Interested high school students should contact their principal or superintendent as needed about the scholarship. Interested transfer or continuing students may also contact SUU's Education Department at (435) 586-7800.

TALENT SCHOLARSHIPS

Talent scholarships are awarded to exceptional performing students in the areas of music, dance, drama, debate, journalism and art. Departments usually require applicants to audition or submit special information to be considered for a talent scholarship. The following is a list of contacts:

WESTERN UNDERGRADUATE EXCHANGE WAIVERS

WUE waivers are awarded to students from participating states based on GPA and ACT/SAT scores. WUE recipients pay approximately 1.5 times the amount of normal Utah tuition.

SENATE BILL 20 WAIVERS

SB20 waivers are awarded to students from other states who live within 100 miles of SUU based on GPA and ACT/SAT scores. The amount of the waiver is approximately 35 percent of the non-resident tuition. Application deadline is Dec. 1.

Further Information

The number and complexity of financial aid opportunities at SUU permit only basic descriptions here. No attempt has been made in this catalog to provide comprehensive details or guidelines.

The awarding of financial aid to be given a student depends upon both the student's eligibility and the availability of funds. As funds are often insufficient to meet the need, the importance of on-time application cannot be overemphasized.
