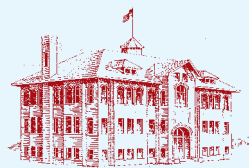

The George S. and Dolores Doré Eccles Foundation

The George S. and Dolores Doré Eccles Foundation is the largest philanthropic foundation in Utah

supporting the arts and culture, the community, education, health care, and preservation and conservation. Established in the 1950s by its namesakes, the Foundation is led today by trustees Spencer F. Eccles, Lisa Eccles, and Robert M. Graham, who continue to carry on the goal of improving the quality of life enjoyed by the people of Utah. Through grants totaling more than \$25 million each year, the Foundation impacts Utahns statewide with grants to projects as large as major university and hospital facilities and as small as community playgrounds. In the past decade alone, the Foundation has contributed more than \$280 million in partnership with hundreds of organizations in the state. These grants, numbering more than 4,000 and ranging in size from under \$1,000 to millions of dollars, represent a significant investment in the economic vitality and future strength of Utah. At Southern Utah University, the Eccles Foundation has generously supported programs for nearly two decades, including student residence facilities, student scholarships, visiting faculty scholars, athletics, and the arts, including the Utah Shakespearean Festival.
