COURSE DESCRIPTION

Sociology is the coolest major! Seriously, what other major is better at helping you understand how society works and how you can use that knowledge to make society better? Together, we will examine: (1) the sociological view; (2) culture and socialization; (3) social interaction, groups, and social structure; (4) deviance and social control; (5) inequality in the U.S. and global inequality; (6) racial/ethnic inequality; (7) gender inequality; (8) several social institutions, such as family, religion, education, government, and the economy; and (9) population, community, health, and the environment.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

(1) Have the opportunity to learn the key terms and concepts of sociology, (2) have the opportunity to learn the major theories of sociology, and (3) have the opportunity to gain factual knowledge about sociology.

GRADING

- Five exams (100% of your final grade)
- Extra credit: every so often, without prior announcement, a one question quiz based on the class readings will be given in class. The quizzes cannot hurt your grade but they can help it. For each correct quiz answer, half of one point will be added to your final average. This is the only extra credit option for this course. There will be no makeup quizzes given.

EXAMS

Including the final, there will be five exams for this course. Each exam will cover class lectures, class discussions, e-reserve readings, extra handouts, in-class videos, and the textbook.

Including the final, each exam will cover two chapters in the textbook. All of the exams will be in-class, closed-book, and will only consist of multiple choice questions. A student who misses an exam will receive a zero for that exam. This, of course, does not include a case involving a documented crisis.

I will drop your lowest score from your first four exams when calculating your final grade. However, everyone must take the final exam. If you miss the final exam, you will receive a zero and that cannot be dropped. In cases where it benefits you to average all five grades, I will do so.

HOW TO USE E-RESERVE

Some exam questions will come from the readings that are on e-reserve. Go to this website www.li.suu.edu/library/circulation and click “I Agree.” Next, type in “Ostrowsky” in the “Instructor’s Last Name” box. There are the readings. Click on them and enjoy.

However, remember three things: (1) some test questions will be based on lecture and class discussion, not the textbook; (2) the only extra credit option for this course requires your classroom attendance; and (3) if you miss a class, you are fully responsible for all materials and announcements covered in class.
