

Poet and writer Michael Sowder is an associate professor of English and an adjunct professor of religious studies at Utah State University. His poetry and writing explore themes of wilderness, Buddhism, yoga, poetics and fatherhood. A long-time meditation teacher, he is the founder of the Amrita Sangha for Integral Spirituality, a nonprofit organization dedicated to exploring and teaching the wisdom of the world's contemplative traditions. Part of his work includes teaching meditation and creative writing in jails and prisons.



Laura received an **Arizona Arts Award** nomination from the Community Foundation for Southern Arizona, Tucson, AZ in June 2009. *Tséyi' / Deep in the Rock: Reflections on Canyon de Chelly*, a book of poetry and photography by Stephen Strom, received the 2007 Arizona Book Association's *Glyph Award* for **Best Poetry** and **Best Book** and was named a **Top Pick** on the *Southwest Books of the Year 2005* list from the Tucson-Pima Public Library.

His stories come from visceral, personal experience, whether in the company of illicit artifact dealers or in deep wilderness. He has published more than a dozen critically acclaimed books, and is a commentator for National Public Radio's Morning Edition. His work has appeared in The New York Times, Los Angeles Times, Men's Journal, Outside, and Orion. At High Country News, he's a contributing editor, and he teaches writing for both University of Alaska in Anchorage and Southern New Hampshire University.

Her latest book: *Zion: A Storied Land* was released in spring, 2007 by the University of Arizona Press. Her naturalist essays have appeared in *Northern Lights, Petroglyph, Canyon Journal, Isotope, Black Ridge Review* and in the book *Comeback Wolves: Western Writers Welcome the Wolf Home*, Winner of the Colorado Book Award for Anthology.

Jim Aton has published articles on environmental history in *Utah Historical Quarterly, Western American Literature, South Dakota Review,* and *Southwest Art.* He has presented the SUU Distinguished Faculty Lecture three times, most recently in September 2009. His monograph, *John Wesley Powell,* appeared as part of the Boise State University's Western Writers Series. His book with photographer Dan Miller, *The River Knows Everything: Desolation Canyon and the Green,* appeared in May 2009; it was a finalist for the 2009 Utah Book Award in non fiction. In January 2010 the University of Utah Press published his book, *John Wesley Powell: His Life and Legacy.* He has produced two films, *Jimmie Jones: Redrock Painter* (with Jon M. Smith) and *Voices of Desolation Canyon* (with Jennifer Little).
