

#### A Year of Grace

2021-2022

The Fall of 2022 marked the conclusion of the Year of Grace—the 40th anniversary—of the Grace Adams Tanner Center for Human Values. It included a variety of programming to celebrate and document Grace's life and lasting impact. These events also reflect the Center's mission to promote access to scholarly and scientific learning in all areas of human values which embrace moral, artistic, intellectual, and spiritual concepts. This was a year of firsts for the center.

Documenting Grace's life and impact was achieved with the public premiere of a documentary commissioned by the Tanner Center entitled Grace. This film (the Tanner Center's first commissioned film) about Grace's life and travels was created by SUU communications professor Jon Smith. A number of Grace's descendants were able to take part in the film's production and screening.

The Grace A. Tanner Lecture in Human Values was delivered by Academy Award-winning actress and founder of her institute on Gender in Media, Geena Davis. Davis spoke on "The Ripple Effect of Intersectional Representation in the Arts," and took part in a discussion with SUU-alumna and Utah Shakespeare Festival actor and director, Melinda Pfundstein. Davis's visit was preceded by a public screening of one of her most celebrated and relevant-to-the-lecture films, "A League of Their Own."

The firsts continued in the form of the Center's first Grace A. Tanner Visiting Writer, Sean Hill. Hill, a Cave Canem Fellow and recipient of a Minnesota Book Award for Poetry, gave a public reading and two creative writing workshops integrated into English Department classes. Hill's visit headlined the 2022 Creative Writing Conference on campus, a collaboration between the Tanner Center and SUU's English Department.

To conclude our "Year of Grace," SUU celebrated Grace's birthday on November 30th with the Day of Grace. These festivities began with a guided tour of the Southern Utah Museum of Art's exhibit, "Reclaiming Agency: Ukrainian Women Photographers Today;" was followed by a lecture from the inaugural Grace A. Tanner Faculty Fellow, Dr. Corey L. Twitchell, entitled "The Almost-Lost Story and Danger of a Single Story: Trauma and Narrative in a Post-Holocaust World;" and concluded with a reception in Grace's honor complete with cake and commemorative gifts for attendees.



### **TEDxSUU Imagine**

Congratulations to Director Melissa Funk and the SUU Speech and Presentation Center for hosting the 2022 TEDxSUU event. In the spirit of ideas worth spreading, TED has created a program called TEDx. TEDx is a program of local, self-organized events that bring people together to share a TED-like experience. Our event is called TEDxSUU, where x = independently organized TED event. At our TEDxSUU event, TEDTalks video and live speakers will combine to spark deep discussion and connection in a small group. The TED Conference provides general guidance for the TEDx program, but individual TEDx events, including ours, are self-organized.

This year's theme was "Imagine." While this event is supervised by a committe made up of SUU faculty and staff, the event is organized and overseen by student interns. Coombs is an assistant professor of communications, primarily teaching sports management courses. He has taught for six years, and prior to that, he worked for SUU Athletics and was a sports writer and NBA Draft analyst for the sports media organization *Bleacher Report*.

Most of Coombs' time is spent outside the classroom, finding and arranging internships for students who want to work in the sports industry. "The best way to get a job in the industry is through networking and internships, so I really encourage all my kids to do as many internships as they can while taking advantage of my personal network to help them succeed," Coombs recommends. # **HSS Honors Spotlight**

#### **Hagen Tuft**

After conducting research by analyzing various films that depict domestic violence, and determining the film's depiction of domestic violence as accurate or inaccurate, senior Criminal Justice student, Hagen Tuft, has set out to write his own screenplay for a short film he plans to shoot in the future. Tuft, also minoring in film studies and who will be graduating in December 2022, has been researching the topic for several semesters and this project fulfills the requirements for his Honors Capstone. His aim is to create a screenplay/film more accurately representative of the victims of domestic violence. Conjoining his research within the criminal justice field as well as real life experience he hopes to create a more informed approach to the filmmaking process and create stories that do not result in public misinterpretation. Tuft has been working closely with Dr. Jeanne Subjack, a professor at SUU in the criminal justice program, in order to receive a professional opinion on domestic violence and the victims of crime

and how those relationships actually are. A large concern with current films is the possibility of a false rhetoric of what these relationships should look like. Tuft hopes this project will set in motion a more educated Hollywood that allows for accurate representation through these stories to allow a more educated populace on domestic violence. Tuft says, "victim's voices often get lost within the criminal justice system, I would want to allow them a voice to speak through the art of film." This capstone project has allowed Hagen the opportunity to research a serious complex topic that directly relates to the criminal justice field and present it through the lens of a filmmaker. After graduation, Tuft plans on entering the criminal justice field as either a crime scene investigator or a victim advocate. He plans on continuing his journey with filmmaking and eventually enter that field using his experience from the system to influence Hollywood. Tuft's creative honors capstone project was presented at the Fall Honors Graduate Symposium on December 7, 2022.
