ABPP Certification

Dr. Michelle Grimes | Associate Professor, Child Clinical Psychology The American Board of Professional Psychology (ABPP) certification is a prestigious recognition in psychology, signifying excellence and specialization. The ABPP acknowledges psychologists' exception dedication. Achieving ABPP certification requires a doctoral degree, extensive post-doctoral experience, licensing, rigorous examinations, peer-reviewed documentation, and adherence to ethical standards.

We enthusiastically congratulate Dr. Michelle Grimes, an Associate Professor in Child Clinical Psychology here at SUU, for her recent accomplishment in receiving her ABPP certification in Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology. Her achievement exemplifies her commitment to the SUU mission of "experiential education leading to personal growth, civic responsibility, and professional excellence."

The SUU Department of Psychology now has the only two ABPP certified Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychologists in the state of Utah. Having board certified faculty sets our programs apart, increases the legitimacy and voice of psychologists in other settings, and also emphasizes the importance of these principles to our students in training.

Summer Institute on Substance Use, Ethics, and Culture

Dr. Jo Ann Bartley | Assistant Professor, Psychology

This summer one of our wonderful professors of psychology, Dr. Jo Ann Bartley, hosted a Summer Institute on Substance Use, Ethics, and Culture. Presenters included members from Alaska, Arizona, and Utah, and presentations took place over 3 different days and had a total of 129 registered participants. Topics included rural mental health, women in prison (particularly those with drug offenses), opioids and their effect on Native American tribes, substance use and diversity in the workforce, telemedicine, and more.

Dr. Bartley has been planning and executing this event for years at the University of Alaska Anchorage, and this was the first time she brought it to Utah as well. "It's important because both states are somewhat rural and don't have a lot of psychological services available. What do we do to get those? How do we help? To be able to be part of that and bring that here to Utah with me is very exciting," Dr. Bartley said in an interview.

Another one of our amazing faculty, Kat Green, took part in an ethics panel where she shared her perspective on the ethics regarding working with minors in a psychology field. When asked about the experience, she said, "Jo Ann did a fantastic job, and, as a new faculty at our university, has just completely immersed herself in making connections with the community connecting us with other universities and institutions and serving the needs of the rural mental health areas."

Overall, the event was a success and Dr. Bartley hopes to see it happen again next year. She also wanted to give a special thanks to our Dean Boreen for supporting the idea from the start and for taking the time to be a part of it.

"My history degree played a major role in my development as it equipped me with the right knowledge and background to propel me into my career as a pastor. I wouldn't have the linguistic, writing, and historical background to perform this job well without SUU."

Jacob Thompson

Since graduating, Jacob Thompson has become a Spanish-English and French-English translator for Melaleuca. "At SUU I had good professors who pushed me. Many told me it was near impossible to become a bidirectional translator for my language pairs. Despite that knowledge, they worked with me to improve my proficiency constantly. SUU opened two semester abroad programs in Spain and France and I was the first SUU student to go to the Universidad de Jaén to study international law in Europe. During that time I signed a contract to only speak the main language of the country I was in. These programs spring-boarded my career. Since graduating, I have tested as near-native in both languages per military testing, got an MA in Translation Studies from the University of Birmingham, freelanced for court cases in Utah and now work full time translating Melaleuca's website into Spanish and French."
