Father-Daughter Collaboration Brings Post-Apocalyptic Story to Life

SUU Professor Dr. Todd Petersen and his daughter, illustrator Zoë Petersen, recently partnered on a unique project commissioned by the Center for Latter-day Saint Arts in New York City. Their work, part of the UP(scale) series, expands earlier creative ideas into larger, more intricate pieces that blend literature, art, and design.

Together, the Petersens created The Investigator / The Observer, a limited-edition artist's book that intertwines two parallel stories set in a post-apocalyptic world. Dr. Petersen's narrative, The Investigator, follows a man who discovers an abandoned Latter-day Saint home and begins a spiritual journey that ultimately leads him to the ruins of the St. Louis Temple. Zoë's contribution, The Observer, adds a second voice: a young woman traveling east in search of her parents

while documenting her journey for her unborn child.

The collaboration is not only a testament to interdisciplinary creativity but also a deeply personal experience for the father-daughter duo. "Zoë is so good at what she does," Petersen said. "It was cool as a father to have an opportunity like this."

Award-winning illustrator Micah Player praised the project as "a fascinating glimpse into how faith and loss intersect in a fallen world."

Both a collectible artifact and a powerful narrative, The Investigator / The Observer reflects the Petersens' shared artistry and vision.

2025 Luce/ACLS Early Career Fellow in China Studies

The SUU Department of Languages and Philosophy is proud to announce that Professor Sandy Zhang has been awarded a 2025 Luce/ACLS Early Career Fellowship in China Studies. This prestigious fellowship provides \$15,000 to recent PhDs without tenure to support research and writing toward a scholarly project.

Dr. Zhang is one of only six scholars nationwide selected for this competitive award, which recognizes innovative work on China's societies, histories, cultures, and global influence. Her project examines the post-Mao literary scene, not only focusing on authors and publishers but also highlighting the essential role of editors in shaping reform-era literary culture, especially through magazines and periodicals. This path breaking research will form the basis of her forthcoming book, On the Brink of Modernity: Chinese Literary Venues in the Reform Era (1978–1989).




"This year's Early Career Fellows and Travel Grantees reflect the continued dynamism of the China studies field at a critical juncture," said Deena Ragavan, ACLS Director of International Programs. "The innovative approaches of these talented scholars enhance our understanding of China by challenging entrenched assumptions."

As part of the fellowship, Dr. Zhang will participate in a professional development workshop on engaged scholarship, designed to help scholars communicate research through writing, media, and public speaking.

The program is made possible by a major grant from the Henry Luce Foundation and is administered by the American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS), the leading representative of American scholarship in the humanities and social sciences.

Cameron Alldredge, PhD
