The Department of Political Science \& Criminal Justice administers an interdisciplinary academic program in International Relations that can serve as the basis for a specialized study of political science, or for a study of International Relations by students with majors in other departments.

Students must submit a program of study to the Department of Political Science \& Criminal Justice two semesters prior to graduation. Students who may wish to substitute courses not listed in the certificate's program of study must obtain prior approval from the program director.

The program requires the successful completion of eight courses, six of which must be chosen from the political science curriculum. Students are also strongly urged to acquire knowledge of a foreign language. Certification is conferred upon graduation.

## Program Mission/Purpose

The certificate program is aimed at helping participants acquire knowledge and expertise vital to establishing credibility for future academic goals, government service, or professional careers through a rigorous and focused course program anchored in Political Science but also demanding additional interdisciplinary emphasis.

## Learning Outcomes

Students completing the certificate program will be able to demonstrate knowledge and expertise regarding the

- Major political players and forces in international relations;
- Major cultural players and forces in international relations;
- Major economic players and forces in international relations.


## Assessment

Student achievement of the learning outcomes will be assessed via a) the assessments conducted in the individual courses comprising the program and b) an oral exit survey with the Program Director.

## Requirements for the International Relations Certificate

I. Students must submit a program of study with the program director at least two semesters prior to graduation.
II. Students must complete eight courses from the list established for the certificate program. At least six of these courses must be political science courses including two core courses: POLS 2100 Introduction to International Relations, and POLS 4600 Theories of International Relations.
III. All requests for course substitutions must be approved by the program director.
IV. Students must complete courses in the program with a 3.0 grade point average.
V. A Final Approval Form which lists courses taken for the certificate must be submitted to the program director along with a current transcript the semester before they intend to graduate.
VI. All courses must be completed with at least a " C ".
VII. The Certificate of International Relations is granted to students who meet Southern Utah University's requirements for graduation with a Bachelor of Arts or Science degree.
