

RN to BSN

The SUU RN to BSN program was recently ranked 35th out of 747 programs available nationwide putting our program in the top 4.7%. The program takes an average of 1 year to complete and allows its BSN graduates to be prepared for new nursing roles in community, leadership, management and often opens the door to continuing education and growth. -Janelle Brown



MSN in Leadership & Administration Update

The DON faculty approved a proposal to begin a Master of Science in Nursing Leadership and Administration program (MSN in Leadership) in 2021. The MSN in Leadership program was approved by the Utah Board of Regents in the summer of 2022, and accredited by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU) in fall 2022. The MSN in Leadership program admitted its first cohort of students in May 2023. The SUU DON and Administration have approved two additional MSN in Leadership program tracks, an RN to MSN in Leadership, and a dual MSN and Master of Business Administration (MSN/MBA) track. Both new MSN in Leadership tracks began admitting students in August of 2023.

The Master of Science in Nursing Leadership and Administration program is a 30-credit online program designed for registered nurses with a bachelor's degree interested in learning and developing leadership skills to advance health equity, promote population health outcomes, and help organizations and governments improve quality and value in healthcare. The program includes courses in leadership theory, leadership ethics, evidence-based practice in leadership, innovation and informatics, health policy for nurse leaders, and practice-based clinical experience. The curriculum also includes three Master of Business Administration (MBA) courses to allow nurses to learn and interact with MBA students. The MSN Leadership program has applied for Accreditation by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE).

A Master of Science in Nursing Family Nurse Practitioner (MSN FNP) program was approved by the SUU DON and Administration in the fall of 2022, and the program was approved by the SUU Board of Trustees in September 2023. The MSN FNP program is a five-semester, 52-credit, online program that includes 750 hours of clinical experience in primary care. The curriculum also requires students to attend a one-week Clinical Intensive course that will be held on campus at SUU before they begin their clinical courses. We plan on opening applications for the program in the spring of 2024 with the first courses beginning in the fall of 2024. Applicants must have a bachelor's degree in nursing and one year of work experience as an RN or LPN. -Mark Siemon
