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

ARTISTIC DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Welcome to Warp & Weft, SUU's Department of Theatre, Dance, & Arts Administration's 2025 Faculty Dance Concert.

These dances are threads—pulled from our separate stories, woven through hours of rehearsal, dialogue, laughter, and quiet (or sometimes rambunctious) work. Each piece holds a touch of every artist in this process.

Like our own lives, each process was different: some smooth sailing at parts, others marked by shifts in casting or in theme. Challenges arose, usually unexpected. Magic, too, would come—moments when pieces fit together, when casts would hold ideas as their own and imbue them with life from lived experience. What you'll see tonight is the fabric of our collective making: the joy, the risk, and the tenderness of being in motion together.

We will take pause between every piece. The lights will come up and I invite you to use this time to settle into what you've just witnessed and prepare for the world of another work. You will have about a song's length in between each piece, perfect time to glance at what is to come, or better yet, to connect with someone nearby. We are stronger as we intertwine with our community; share your reflections of the piece you just witnessed, or perhaps a personal narrative that echoes its theme.

Thank you for joining us in witnessing the beauty of this woven work. May you leave reminded of your own threads—the ways you move through the world, and the ways the world moves through you.

In Tagalog, we have the word yakap, which means "to hold tightly" or "embrace." My hope is that when the concert is over, you leave wrapped in a blanket woven from these threads of humanity, community, and story—so warm it gives you the sense of being held, of the embrace of a dear friend.
