

Car Camping

The advantage to car camping is you can take as much stuff as will fit into your vehicle. So this list may have things you don't have to bring, but you can because it all fits in the car.

Note: * means the OEC will provide

Gear

- Tent*, hammock, or sleep in vehicle if desired
- Sleeping pad, cot, or air mattress
- Sleeping bag
- Pillow
- Camp chair
- Headlamp, flashlight, or lantern
 - Extra batteries
- First Aid Kit
- Day pack (See Hiking packing list for ideas on what to pack for a day hike)
- Compass/map
- Pocket Knife
- Duffle bag or backpack for gear

Kitchen/Cooking Supplies

- Two-burner stove*
- Dutch oven* (if desired)
 - Charcoal*
 - Lighter Fuel*
- Firewood* (if fires are allowed)
- Lighter or matches*
- Pots and pans*
- Utensils, plates/bowls, and cup/water bottle
- Dishwashing bins, dish soap, sponge or rag*
- Trash bags*
- Cooler*
 - Ice*

Personal Hygiene

- Toothbrush & toothpaste
- Toilet paper sealed in a ziplock baggy
- Camp soap
- Towel
- Hand sanitizer
- Comb/brush
- Sunscreen

- Bug spray

Clothing

- Underwear
- Pajamas
- T-shirts & pants
- 2 Warm jacket/layer (Fleece or down jackets are best for warmth)
- Rain jacket
- Hat for sun
- Hat for warmth
- Hiking boots
- Flip flops/sandals/comfy shoes (For when you are just relaxing at the campsite, it is nice to have some shoes to chill in)

GO WISE - make sure you have a **w**icking synthetic layer next to your skin, a **i**nsulating fleece or wool layer for warmth, a **s**hell layer for rain and wind protection, and an **e**xtra layer for added warmth.

Miscellaneous

- Sunglasses
- Chapstick
- Beanie (weather dependant, but is always nice for sleeping in the cold)
- Bandana (Has many uses and is always good to have)
